Tool Use (Potato Peelers and Knives): Provide a thorough safety briefing on the proper use of whittling tools. Constant Supervision: Ensure that a staff member or responsible adult is with each child at all times while they are using knives or peelers. Protective Equipment: Provide protective gloves to children and ensure they are used properly. 	 Skill Development: Enhances fine motor skills and hand-eye coordination. Creativity: Encourages children to engage in creative and focused craftsmanship. Confidence: Builds confidence in using tools safely under supervision.
Exploring the Site (Community Garden)	Medium	 Supervision: Children will be closely supervised by staff at all times, with awareness talks and reminders about safety.
